Kevin Gallo (aged 33) was charged by the police on Friday morning after the death of Daniel Thomsen. Investigations of the incident by the police have established the following facts:

- Kevin was at his sister Renee's home, where she lived with her husband, Daniel.
- A few weeks ago, Daniel had thrown Renee down the stairs, breaking her arm and Kevin was worried that Daniel would attack Renee again.
- One night, Kevin, Renee and Daniel had been having a meal. Renee accidentally knocked a drink over. Daniel shouted at Renee and called her a 'stupid woman'. He said that if she didn't clear the drink up quickly he would give her another beating.
- Kevin told Daniel to stop treating his sister that way. Daniel began laughing about throwing Renee down the stairs and made several nasty comments about her.
- Daniel's comments made Kevin very angry. He saw a hammer and then began repeatedly hitting Daniel on the head with it, shouting 'die'. Daniel died instantly.

- Doctor Teal, who has been on duty for 18 hours, examines Donald and says he needs an urgent blood transfusion to save his life.
- Donald refuses for religious reasons. Donald is allergic to antibiotics but Doctor Teal does not check for this and give him some anyway. Donald dies.
